

It includes: an overview of the legislative framework; guidance on providing the best possible service; issues and dilemmas related to sharing information; and tracing and intermediary services.

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

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


Devising a care plan

Considers some fundamental steps involved in devising a care plan. It explores the importance of tailoring the plan closely to the child; including their wishes and feelings; involving other adults; knowing when it's safe for the child to go home; and considering options such as care by relatives, fostering, adoption and residential care.

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Explores the important issue of recruiting new carers and welcoming a wide range of permanent families. It addresses themes such as recruiting widely; preparing and assessing applicants; producing high quality material about children; and featuring them in a variety of ways. It also looks at methods of family finding, including exchange days and DVD/video profiling events.

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Provides essential information and advice on preparing for and attending court. Subjects covered include: initiating proceedings; understanding the court basics; considering and preparing for the wide range of orders the court can make; working with lawyers and Guardians; presenting evidence and answering questions; and action planning and implementing decisions.

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
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Helps workers to consider their role in identifying and responding to child neglect. It explores: understanding why parents neglect their children; the lessons to be learned from serious case reviews; and how best to intervene to improve children's lives.

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Making matches

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Placing disabled children

Addresses a range of key challenges, including: why and when do disabled children require permanent foster care or should they/could they be adopted?; how can suitable families be recruited and supported?; is it possible to work directly with all children, however seriously impaired?; and should a disabled child be separated from a sibling group? It provides an essential checklist for anyone seeking the right new family for a disabled child.

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Explores the ways in which looked after children can be best supported to enable them to thrive and achieve their potential at school and beyond. Subjects covered include: assessing the impact of personal and family history on a child's education; getting to know and work with the carers; finding out about the school; forming relationships with key school staff members; facilitating links between carers and the school; and supporting the child through transitions.

Issues covered include: keeping siblings together or helping them to part; listening to each child and getting to know the sibling group; using kinship care; recruiting and preparing families for specific sibling groups; and supporting siblings and families after placement.

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

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Caring for unaccompanied asylum seeking children and young people

This series of introductory booklets provides information for foster carers and residential care workers who are, or who will be, looking after unaccompanied asylum-seeking children and young people from certain countries. Pathways to permanence for black, Asian and mixed ethnicity children

Explores the care pathways of minority ethnic children in three authorities in England, and considers possible differences in decision making and outcomes for them, in comparison with white children, especially in relation to permanence. It raises key questions about our understanding of ethnicity and culture and how these are reflected in social work practice.

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Helping birth families

Explores and evaluates adoption support using data collected from eight agencies providing independent services to birth relatives, as well as from interviews with birth relatives with recent experience of losing a child to adoption. Referral and take-up rates of support services are described, as are birth relatives' views on the adoption process, independent support services and the factors associated with satisfaction with these services.

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Enhancing adoptive parenting

Describes the first rigorous test in the UK exploring whether the addition of one-on-one post-adoption parenting advice made a difference when compared with routine support services. It covers the rationale and content of two specially devised parenting advice programmes, what the adopters thought of the advice they received and what the parent advisers thought about delivering the programmes.

This book presents the comprehensive findings of a longitudinal study that followed up a group of adopted children, their adoptive parents and birth relatives, where some form of post-adoption contact was planned. It aimed to explore people's experiences of contact and its impact on children and adults.

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Beyond the adoption order

This groundbreaking research provides information on how many adoptions disrupt, and why. It provides detailed estimates of the number of adoptions that disrupt postorder, explores the factors that influence disruption and compares the stability of adoption orders with special guardianship and residence orders.

This study investigates the characteristics and pathways of looked after children, and the risk and protective factors that may reduce the likelihood of offending and promote resilience. It demonstrates that the care system can be effective in promoting security, resilience and pro-social values, but significant concerns remain about the risk of offending and of criminalisation.

Adversity, adoption and afterwards

This unique study explores the long-term outcomes for a group of girls, now women in middle age, adopted from orphanages in Hong Kong, by families in the UK. It offers a rare opportunity to explore the impact of adverse early experience, modified by adoption in creating opportunities and risks, over 50 years. The book presents the main findings of the study, combining an in-depth analysis of some of the key outcomes with a qualitative analysis of face-to-face interviews with the women.

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Comparing long-term placements for young children in care

This book reports on the Care Pathways and Outcomes Study which since 2000 has been tracking a group of children who were under the age of five and in care in Northern Ireland on a particular census day. It explores similarities and differences between placement types, including: children's attachments, self-concept, education, health and behaviour; parents'/carers' stress; social support; family communication; and contact with birth families.


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Facilitating adoptions from care

John Triseliotis was a world-renowned expert on children raised by people other than their birth parents. The articles and book chapters in this collection are a tribute to his pioneering work. They reflect the full range of his long career and the breadth of subject matter he wrote about. Many of the issues he explored – including intercountry adoption, the support needs of carers and assessments of parenting – continue to be of vital significance today.

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Keeping them in the family

This study provides invaluable information on the benefits and challenges of kinship care and what needs to be done if it is to be used effectively. The study tracked 113 children in England, removed from their parents' care because of child protection concerns and placed with kin through the courts. The placements were then assessed in terms of: whether they lasted as long as necessary and provided good quality and safe care; the quality of the relationship between the child and carer; and how well the child was functioning.

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Care or control?

This important study focuses specifically on the use of foster care for young people on remand as an alternative to custodial and residential accommodation. It considers the processes by which young people become involved in offending behaviour, how this behaviour can be exacerbated by involvement with the penal system, and how community interventions can have a positive impact on a young person's behaviour and sense of identity.
