Thank you for that, Tommy. You just mentioned cultural competence, which is an area that is, I know a passion and a a particular kind of you have expertise in that around delivering training. So I suppose.

OK. So it's really for me. It's all of the different people involved in in the, the, the young person's life, whether that's sort of directly and it's the foster care or whether it's the social worker or in a way, even if it's when I when.

I'm thinking about cultural.

The people involved in designing and delivering that is all with the same aim, essentially of improving that experience. And when you're looking at the overall community and the care experience community, I I guess and when you think about fostering communities, it's it's everybody involved, everybody trying to sort of work towards that, that same aim of just sort of improving that.

Experience. But then fostering communities for me can be I've been involved with lots of different in lots of different settings with researchers. So, you know, carrying out research within the care experience.

Relation to look at education attainment. I'm obviously involved in this committee. I sat on various fostering panels before I've I've worked directly with students and young people. So these are all different routes that you wouldn't necessarily think of initially that that actually kind of contribute toward that.

And actually are a part of that community as well. So yeah, that's what that's what springs to.

Thank you. Because I think there's there's something about some fostering communities naturally kind of are created or naturally exist, I should say. Yeah. And then there's, I think there's, as you were saying, there's also something around we within the sector have a responsibility and and the luxury in some ways to be able to create some communities.

Way and some of that is around creating communities.

Of some shared and common values around, as you've said, trying to improve experiences for our children and young people, and that might be thinking about their identity needs that might be thinking about the area that they live and what's available to them. It might be about equipping foster carers with feeling.

Confident around either around meeting identity needs or around ensuring that they, the child young person they're caring for has enough time with their family members so they spend enough time with family it it it, it can be many, many things, can't it? But I think that community, my experience of working with foster carers is they are absolutely amazing.

Thing at at connecting with one another and supporting one another around trying to do whatever's best for the children, young person or children. Young people that are being cared for and the foster care is around them. But sometimes I think foster carers might need some additional support, steer resources, time, space to do that.

As chair of the Fostering Advisory Committee, I think you and I will continue to have conversations along with the vice chair around the kind of areas that we would like to think about, reflect on and and essentially influence with with what, how whichever ways.

OK, so some of the important areas for me are around the protected characteristic.

Some real changes in my life were sort of education attainment something and and the work that I've done looking at education attainment as being something that's made me realise just.

How well, how important that is? Anyway, we know that, don't we? But I think there needs to be more push to encourage young people and children in care to to go beyond whatever the expectations might be. And I know that that's something that does come up quite often in in some of the stigma related training that I've carried out sort of expectations of young people in care and things like that. So.

That's one thing. As I said, the protected characteristic and things around identity and now I don't necessarily mean just identity when it comes to ethnicity. I think the identity which is linking it with the protected characteristic of the overall care experienced community, I think.

That there are lots of issues around stigma and misconceptions. Preconceptions that we need to work on. And I think if we were to embed that protected characteristic, then that might mean that companies, schools have an obligation to educate young people in, in schools and companies, their employees on this group of of people.

And as a result, I hope over time we'll sort of reduce stigma. So I wondered if there was something that we can sort of steer towards within the the group.

Focusing around that and pushing education. But there are other things that have come up that I think are really important that we do need.

To sort of like, you know, focus on too.

Thank you. They feel like really good starting points, don't they? There's something listening to you talking about us needing to always strive to be ambitious, really, really ambitious for our children and young people in care and never to assume like you were saying, never to have preconceptions, not to have, make assumptions that would not lead to.

The taller young person that we're thinking.

Well, should be hopefully equipped, enabled, supported to every opportunity that's available to all of their peers. And however that looks, yeah, so there is something around that. And I think those are if if they're key aims for us to kind of get the the committee to focus on over the next 6 to 12 months, that's a brilliant starting point.

Yes, I would say I think there's there's plenty there isn't there for us to be us to be doing.
